
The Money Mystery

Where has all the money gone? Here is a simple break out of how your 2015 yearly dues dollar is currently budgeted. Collectively, we collected about 28,200 dollars in dues. Although this is a "bare bones" budget, the good news is that TVSD is sustainable as an organization if the only income we receive is membership dues.

The really, really, good news is that your collective response to our year-end fund drive has provided over \$20,000 dollars to sponsor a wide variety of programs for TVSD members. This allows us to bring you quality events and programs little or no cost for our members and a reasonable cost to our community attendees when venues allow their participation. We sort of

Care Team...Off and Running

As of January 1, 2015 TVSD is functioning without any paid staff. As a result the Care Team has reorganized. How the reorganization is working will be revaluated in six months. It's mission statement supports that of the Village -- to assist members to live in their own homes in Tierrasanta. Briefly, that support may include direct assistance, as requested by members, through phone calls, home visits, bereavement support, providing food, transportation, agency referrals and transition planning.

Members can access the new system by calling the Village phone number and asking for help from the Care Committee. That request will be passed on to the Chairperson, Jean Kerr. Jean will contact the member requesting help.

We have divided Tierrasanta into mini communities, each with volunteer captains and cocaptains. Jean Kerr will pass member's requests on to one of these volunteers. Gail Schreiber and Marti Batchelder held a training session with volunteers as to how to function in that role. These volunteers will call everyone in their area at least once. Those members who don't use computers will be called on a more regular basis as Jean says".... so everybody feels connected and included."

Jean reports that Marti and John Batchelder have volunteered to help those who need to transition to a more supportive living situation. Laurie Pfab is updating our resource list of agencies in the greater community.

The Care team wants to help the Village meet its mission. Remember, we are volunteers that are also members. Our intentions are good, and we want to be of assistance. Please do not hesitate to call the Village office (858-569-9119) if you need help with something. Together we'll figure it out! And, new volunteers are welcome.

Getting to Know You

This month's Villager has roots in the inland Southwest. Silver City, NM is her birthplace, and she is the third of four children. Memories of her first twelve years are colored by stories of her uncle, a county sheriff, running Billy the Kid out of town and of her grandfather, who homesteaded in Deming, NM, joining the forces to fight against Pancho Villa. Saturday nights in the summer the family hosted musicals in their front yard with her mother at the piano, father and uncle playing fiddles, and other family friends and relatives playing guitars.

After World War II the mining industry in the area died, and her father moved the family to Colorado Springs, Colorado. There she was fortunate to get an excellent education and became excited about knowledge and learning.

A couple of years out of High School she took the exam to enter the Peace Corps and was invited to join with training to go to Iran or Afghanistan. Most of her time was spent in peaceful Kabul. Afghanistan at that time was a constitutional monarchy with progressive ideas about the role of women. Her exposure to Muslim art, architecture, culture and people allowed her to form friendships with many natives.

She returned to Washington, DC determined to finish her education and enjoy the excitement of the city, politics and the accomplishments of women in the feminist movement.

Out of college and social work graduate school, she met her husband at a St. Patrick's Day dinner party. She thought he was handsome and funny and we "did not end the evening when the others did." They married one and a half years later.

After the birth of her daughter the family moved to Grand Junction, Colorado in an attempt to give their children an idyllic small town life. A son came along in 1981. They enjoyed the outdoor life of hiking, horseback riding and camping. Both she and her husband held jobs as social workers, and in 1990 they decided to "return to the city" and San Diego was their goal.

As a social worker our Villager worked for Kaiser for 21 years and though retired, she continues to see a few patients through a private mental health clinic. She now is appreciative of being able to explore her interest in art history, theater, music, cooking, gardening, and doing her own and others' genealogy. She is an active

member of the Unitarian church and the community it offers.

Always wanting to continue her adventures in travel, she participated in the Village trip to Paris last year. Current adventures are with her year old grandson and preparing to celebrate her daughter's graduation from law school with a family reunion.

So, who is this adventuresome person? Final clue: she will bake for any occasion or bake sale.

"Sale" emails: those unbelievable prices could be too good to be true. These email links can direct you to a phishing site that steals your payment information. Visit the online retailer to verify that the advertised prices are legitimate.

Shopping online? Always look for the 'https' in the URL. The 's' means the site is more secure for sharing information.

Avoid using a <u>debit card</u> for online purchases. Credit card charges can be disputed but debit accounts may not be reimbursed if the card number falls into the wrong hands.

Making a donation? Before writing a check, make sure you're supporting a legitimate cause. Research the organization on a reputable directory like Charity Navigator or the Better Business Bureau.
