#### Someone You Should Know by Carol Lee

Patricia (Trish) and her younger sister were born and raised in Louisville, Kentucky. Their mother was a school teacher and their father was a nurse at the local VA hospital. After high school and secretarial school, Trish tolerated the winters until 1971 when she contacted a cousin in San Jose who encouraged her to join him there--and she did. She found work in Silicon Valley.

During this time, Trish had a daughter and found that the Bay Area had wonderful experiences to which she wanted to expose her child and herself. They went to beaches, theater performances, and even heard Nelson Mandela speak in Oakland. She found employment working as an Administrative Assistant and one of the most exciting experiences was being an extra in a "made for Sunday TV Movie" being filmed in San Jose. In 1989 she was in a movie with Dennis Franz and Whoopi Goldberg titled "Kiss Shot".

In 2001, Trish met her future husband, Ray Newbill, soon after her daughter left for college at San Diego State. They both worked in Silicon Valley, and one lunch time Trish and a girlfriend happened to go to his company's cafeteria. It was crowded, and while her girlfriend went to get her food, Trish looked for a place for them to sit. She caught the eye of a man who was about to leave his table and the girlfriend Trish had come with knew Ray and introduced them. It turned out they knew some of the same people, having worked at General Electric at the same time. # Special Story after seeing the Movie "Amelia" which was shown March 13 on Classic Movies by Mike Rigdon

Below is the Certificate awarded to all Sailors who cross the Equator on Navy ships. This one was for *Walter Stevens*, a Fire Control 2nd Class aboard the USS Lamson, DD-307. The Lamson was involved in the largest Search and Rescue mission in Naval History to date, 1937. This was a rare Certificate – notice the pictures of Amelia Earhart and her co-Pilot, Fred Noonan.

Although I never served aboard a ship with Walter Stevens, I met him while he was a Docent at the Veterans Memorial Museum in Balboa Park in 2000. He served aboard my ship, the USS Jupiter in the early 1950s. While our Jupiter Reunion was held in 2000 here in San Diego, Walt gave our attendees a full guided tour of the former Balboa Hospital Base Chapel, now the Veterans Memorial Museum.

I was fortunate to visit with him over several years before his passing in 2004. See his amazing story on Page 10 of this issue.....

After the search for Amelia Earhart, Walt served aboard the USS Pritchett, DD 561 and the USS Sterrett, DD 407 from the Marianas to the Philipines invasion, escorting the carriers and fending off Kamikazes. He then was assigned aboard the Sterrett to train with the 6th Marine Division at Guadalcanal for the invasion of Okinawa.

#### Memories of Machinist Mate Chief Walter Stevens

Walt Stevens from National City, CA enlisted in the Navy in 1935, serving on many ships until retirement as MM Chief in 1960. As a Fireman 2nd aboard USS Lamson, DD 367 Walt recalls leaving Norfolk, through the Panama Canal and arriving at San Diego on July 2, 1937, the day Amelia Earhart was announced missing. The USS Lexington and her air group arrived from Long Beach, anchored off Point Loma until 5 DD's joined her on a record breaking run to Honolulu, to be refueled and race to Holland Island where they scoured the area around the Equator to Japan for any sign of Amelia and Fred Noonan, her co-pilot. After weeks of searching the decision was that she must have run out of fuel and drown. The Lamson crossed the Equator while on the search and his certificate below shows pictures of Earhart and Noonan.

#### AD-3 USS Dobbin at Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941

(a) CincPac despatch 102102 December 1941.

In accordance with the provisions of reference (a), the following is submitted:

Three enemy planes, identified by yellow disks painted on wings, attacked at 0910. They came in low, approaching from the starboard quarter. The heavy fire from the *Dobbin*, and from the destroyers of Squadron ONE alongside, caused the plane to swerve and cross just astern. Three bombs were dropped, resulting in near misses on starboard quarter, astern, and port quarter. They appeared to be

300-lb. bombs. Fragments from these bombs struck the stern of this ship, causing the personnel and material damage described below. All personnel casualties were members of No. 43" A.A. gun located on the after end of the boat deck. No other attack was experienced by this nest of ships. The nest consisted of the *Dobbin*, with the *Hull, Dewey, Worden, MacDonough*, and *Phelps* alongside port side. The ships alongside started clearing at 0920, the last one getting away at 1450. Repair personnel from this ship were turned to continuously during this period and during the attack to assist them in getting machinery reassembled. *Dobbin* issued replacement ammunition to DDs alongside so that they left filled up. The personnel of No. 43" A.A. gun were badly hit. But in spite of this, Coxswain H.A. Simpson, U.S. Navy, in charge, reorganized his crew, got them in hand, and continued the fight against planes which approached within gun range. Four spare .50 caliber machine guns and thirteen .30 caliber machine guns were broken out, mounted and manned, this action being accomplished during the course of the attacks. All boats of the *Dobbin* were sent into the landings immediately, and have been in continuous service wherever needed since. The Commanding Officer is pleased to report that the performance of all hands was excellent and the conduct most commendable, characterized by a strong will to fight and to turn to enthusiastically in any and every way possible to assist in servicing the destroyers and in protecting their own ship.
