Someone You Should Know.....by Carol Lee

James Gunnar Schalin was born and raised near Wrigley Field in Chicago, Illinois. His father, Hans, emigrated from Sweden to the U. S. in the late 1920s. Watchmaking was the trade he brought with him to America. Gunnar's mom, Josephine, was born in Chicago; her family was from the Austria-Hungary area in Europe. His older brother Rich died in 2017.

In the mid-1950s, when Jim was about ten years old, the family moved to Arlington Heights, a northwest suburb of Chicago. There he learned to ride his first bike and then spread his suburban wings. Gunnar attended a parochial school in sixth through eighth grade, then went to Arlington High School. There his class moto was: "1-9-6-3! That's the year they set us free!"

At the University of Illinois, his Pi Kappa Phi fraternity brothers began calling him by his middle name, Gunnar, primarily because he did not like it. The name stuck, although family and old friends still call him Jim. His niece and two nephews call him Uncle Jimmy. Gunnar studied Human Factors Engineering, with minors in chemistry, physics, and math. His dream was to design spacecraft cockpits...but he was ahead of his time.

After college, Gunnar served in the Army. After flight school he flew helicopters with the 3rd Squadron, 17th Air Cavalry in Vietnam for nineteen months. The unit engaged in a lot of combat, reconnaissance, and rescue missions. He twice was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for valor in rescuing soldiers under fire. Towards the end of his tour, he was appointed as the Squadron's Intelligence Officer. The unit interpreters reported to him. Lan, the chief interpreter, later escaped from Vietnam and contacted Gunnar from a refugee camp. Gunnar sponsored Lan into the U. S. They remain good friends.

After his active service, Gunnar transferred to the Army Reserve, where he completed his 30-year military career as a colonel. He had some great assignments, the most significant was being selected as the first Commander of the 168th Combat Aviation Group. Upon mobilization his headquarters would be responsible for units in Germany, Washington, Illinois, and Southern California.

Coming off active duty, Gunnar was hired by Rockwell International, Missile Systems Division, in Columbus, Ohio as a Human Factors Engineer. Later he served as a Marketing representative and then as an Engineering Test Pilot during the development of the laser-guided HELL-Fire missile. Since the Apache helicopter was still in development, Gunnar flew the Cobra helicopter as the launch aircraft during the tests. The technology was so good that he never missed his target.

In 1979, Gunnar was recruited by Teledyne Ryan, in San Diego as a Marketing representative for its radar products. Later he worked in subcontracts and program management. The division closed in 1994. Gunnar used that opportunity to finish his M.S. in Business at SDSU. That led to employment at Southwestern College. There, he served as Director of the Procurement Technical Assistance Center until retirement in 2015.

In 2018 Gunnar read about the Village movement in a financial magazine which mentioned TVSD. So he investigated. After meeting Ginny and others, he applied for membership. He has enjoyed many TVSD social occasions. He especially enjoys activities that involve food. He gladly accepts invites to play bridge with Anne Hoffman's group. He signed up as a TVSD driver and has joined the Time Bank. Gunnar was a check-in group facilitator for the Stronger Memory 12-week pilot program. As part of that he has written 80+ pages of his early memories. He thinks that the program

works and plans to continue with it. Gunnar would love seeing TVSD membership grow, and he thinks that hiring Cassandra as Marketing Director was the right move.

Gunnar did not hesitate when asked if he could share his own personal 'words to live by'. As its first Commander, he was responsible for choosing the motto of the 168th Combat Aviation Group. The Bible verse, Isaiah 40:31, inspired his choice: "With wings as eagles." Gunnar, we all thank you for your service to our country, and to us.



John Edwin Lester

September 17, 1938 - September 8, 2021

Longtime Tierrasanta resident, John Lester, passed away on September 8 of a recurrence of Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma. He and his wife Barbara were charter homeowners in the Villa Barbados neighborhood, having purchased their lot and chosen

the model of the house to be built during the fall of 1971. They moved into their Montego Drive home in February, 1972, and have continued to live there since.

John Lester was born in Mt. Vernon, MO, He was the youngest of three boys. He grew up in southeast Missouri, graduating high school in Sikeston, MO. He received his degree in Forestry from the University of Missouri and then served in the Army. After the Army, he worked in the Idaho & Sequoia National Forests, but he found that his training in timber management and conservation took a second to fighting fires, so he moved to San Diego where he earned a degree in history and a teaching credential at San Diego State University. He later

returned to SDSU for a MA in education.

In September, 1969, he was assigned to teach history and science at Hale Jr High where he met another first-year teacher. Barbara Stecker, who was to

another first-year teacher, Barbara Stecker, who was to become his future wife. They were married in June, 1970. He later transferred to Crawford High School where he taught history and geography, retiring from

teaching in 1995. John was also a dedicated Charger football fan until they deserted San Diego.

John enjoyed traveling. He and Barbara explored much of the U.S. and Europe, as well as New Zealand. Their love of nature and the mountains

drew them to purchasing land in Idyllwild in 1978 and they began what would be the beginning of many summers of building a geodesic dome cabin.

After retirement, John discovered roses. He became an active member of the San Diego Rose Society and with great enthusiasm filled the front and back yards of their home with over 200 rose bushes. Many neighbors on Montego Drive and Tierrasanta friends both admired and enjoyed the prolific beauty of John's roses. He became an ARS Rosarian and Judge and enjoyed helping others with their gardens. He traveled as far as Scotland to exhibit and

judge rose shows, while winning awards at those shows and as well as the San Diego County Fair.

Another great love of his life was his canine companions. Over the years, John & Barbara shared their home with 10 amazing rescues. Their latest two, Riley and Tulip, were his devoted companions to the end.

"Clean Crafted Wine" Social

A good time was had by all and we even learned a lot about "clean crafted wine" to boot!

Members of the Tierrasanta Village of San Diego met at the home of Carol and Pete Burgert to taste and learn about clean crafted wine by Scout & Cellar Winery.

We were taught that clean crafted grapes are grown naturally with no synthetic pesticides and the produced wines have no added chemicals or additives to alter the taste. Wine growers

can add additives and chemicals and don't have to disclose that on the label—those chemicals change the taste of the wine so that it tastes the same year after year

no matter what the grape actually taste like. Grapes





TVSD offers the Stronger Memory Program because it focuses directly on memory. Its effectiveness is supported by research. by Carmela Cavero

The end of August marked the completion of the 12-week pilot program. The participants met in small groups for weekly check-in and support.

IN response to the question: subjectively, have you noticed any cognitive/memory changes? These are responses from participants:

"Not as foggy as I was –just trying to slowing down and listen well."

"Feel a little sharper and confident with memory."

"I really feel it helps me."

A respondent felt she noticed no change because of her own lack of consistency.

"I find myself thinking about the process rather than jumping into something."

"I notice better memory."

"I am beginning to notice my visual memory coming back and sometimes I feel like my mind is more focused."

"I don't give up trying to remember short term as easily as before and I can often remember."

"Slight change for the better perhaps with words coming more easily."

"I am not too bad cognitively so I didn't expect much change."


"I have not noticed any cognitive changes but am more aware of what is presented and attempting to act on it." "Because of the journal exercises, I remember a lot more details about past experiences that I had forgotten."

"No real noticeable change (5 responses). I really want to prevent/ "ward off" memory failure."

Many national and governmental health agencies have identified age as an important risk factor for cognitive problems and mild cognitive impairment. The prevalence of MCI is between 12- 18% in those aged over 60--and almost 24% over the age of 80. Some of those with this diagnosis will continue on to suffer from dementia.

Specifically, the prefrontal cortex is the part of the brain involved in memory. Now we have research at an international level to indicate that writing by hand, reading, and completing simple arithmetic is effective in improving cognitive function and memory.
